# Please explain

We are actively engaged in the UK Roundtable for Sustainable Soy, which collates usage and origin data for soy usage in animal feed to facilitate risk assessments and collaborative engagement. The aim of this group, which includes the UK government, is to move the UK feed supply sector, that uses any South American soy, to independently verified deforestation and conversion free material as defined by the Accountability Framework. As part of our work through the roundtable we are working to include deforestation free specifications in the UK animal feed industry, supported by FEMAS and FEFAC.

We are members of the signatories of support for the Cerrado manifesto who are seeking long term funding mechanisms for farmers to incentivise the protection of forest and other natural habitats, while actively advocating for improved governance and protection. Particular progress is being made with soy protein concentrate traders who have committed to a 2020 cut off date for zero deforestation for all of the soy they purchase regardless of end market. A monitoring programme has been established with WWF Brazil.

We estimate usages based on a sample of farms and scale this over our annual volumes in UK, Ireland and Holland to purchase the equivalent credits to the soy consumed by the animals we purchased. .

We are founding members of the Soy Transparency Coalition which facilitates the global traders of soy to report their progress to zero deforestation soy publicly.

We are supporting the development of due diligence regulation in the UK and in Europe.

We are also in the process of undertaking our first formal TCFD environmental risk assessment to understand potential risk's and opportunities along with the potential financial impact.

As part of our updated supply chain environmental policy, mitigating and eliminating deforestation is a key aspect and requirement of our suppliers.

We have considered the capacity of our supply chains to provide soy to the high protein specification required and are confident the supply is available without further deforestation. Our focus is on supporting the protection of forests in the Cerrado where the majority is sourced from. Continuity of supply is key for, hence we engage in the Soy Transparency Coalition to assess the risk and the measures being taken by each trader. Alternative supply regions and feed materials are being developed as contingencies

The quality of South American beef is high but we are able to source equivalent quality beef elsewhere, so shifting supply areas does not create a quality risk.

Our approach is to work towards zero net deforestation and conversion by the protection of existing forests and the restoration of deforested areas with the aim of biome wide zero conversion areas. Our area of focus is the Cerrado biome where we are working collaboratively as signatories of the Statement of Support for the Cerrado Manifesto

We are working collaboratively to establish verifiable deforestation and conversion free supply of soy for animal feed and only purchase beef where the producers can verify the origin farms and confirm they are not engaged in deforestation.
